MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR



Bulloo Shire Council is working collectively with Noni McCarthy focusing on establishing a Housing Strategy to further accommodate Bulloo Shire residents both current and new.

"Council has found lack of housing to be an on going issue which has prohibited new residents moving to the area, we don't have sufficient housing to establish the growth of the shire, for Bulloo Shire to grow we need residents and families".

Lew along with Councillors, Managers, Housing staff, business and government representatives participated in a Housing Strategy Workshop facilitated by Noni McCarthy on Wednesday 19 August 2020.

The aim of the workshop was:

- To understand the current housing availability and suitability in Thargomindah
- To investigate future needs and aspiration for the population of the town
- To initiate a plan for future housing availability

This strategy will also inform the Readiness Assessment for Migrant Placement Project currently underway across the South West. Availability of appropriate housing and employment is key to attracting new families to the shire now and into the future.

As previously mentioned Council is currently working to Construct the Independent Living Units to assist with elderly housing however the next phase needs to be family accommodation.

This is an exciting direction for Bulloo Shire to towards, population growth will increase:

- Local economy
- Employment
- Enrolment numbers at the School etc.

FROM THE CEO'S DESK



"A couple of things are happening in the BIG Local Government Picture".

Recently the Mayor and I attended the inaugural meeting of the Western Alliance of Councils. This is an amalgamated body formed to consider the big issues for the bush from North West Qld to Central West Qld and South West Qld. This new Alliance will encompass, 22 shires representing 60 000 people and covers 60% of the State of Queensland. It will also provide a louder voice for the west.

As you would realise our state is South East Corner centric simply because of the larger population and we tend to get forgotten about, out in this country. I believe the forming of this alliance will be a large enough voice that they will need to listen to us. Say 50k of the 60,000 people were voters, that is 50,000 votes that may or may not go to the political party in power and do they want to risk that much of a change when a lot of governments have had small majorities that require them to work with the minor parties, such as the Katter party, to hold Government?

Anne Leahy, Lachlan Millar, David Littleproud, Stirling Hinchliffe, Sen Glen Butcher, Scott Bucholz and James Mc Grath as well as a couple of departmental Directors General attended on the days and this could be considered a strong roll up by the Pollies.

The big issues we will be looking at with this organisation are, the cost of electricity, the connectivity, be it internet or mobile, for the bush, obviously roads, but also water to sustain industry, regionalisation of commerce and industry and employment. We need the big boys to understand that regional is not east coast centric but includes the whole of Queensland and therefore they need to consider the numerous opportunities out in our country.

On a more local front, Council is a member of the South West Regional Economic Development (SWRED) and the SWLGA. For some time, these groups have

been ineffective in their outcomes and have at times been duplicating similar issues.

The member Councils have agreed this needs to cease and subsequently commissioned a report to assess the opportunities that we could consider to make this group more effective. In the end it was decided that we would form a new group that covers all the issues and become a SW Region of Councils.

Similar to what occurs in NWQ, Far North QLD. This organisation will cover all aspects of local Government and Economic Development and will be staffed with a CEO to be located in Brisbane and a Project Officer to be located somewhere in the region. The intent is to make the CEO accessible to Government Ministers and Departments to lobby on our behalf and also to meet with the big end of town with financial institutions and other large production companies to seek diversification of commerce and industry to the region.

You may also have noticed a bit of work going on around the cooling ponds enclosure. We are moving into the second stage of what was the Geothermal project to generate power and cool our water down. However, this became unfeasible and the project became a solar power and water-cooling project.

What you can see at the moment is the construction of 3 large water tanks that will be part of the cooling and holding tanks that will enable us to hold enough water to cover the towns usage for a day if we need to go off line to mend broken mains etc. The water will be sanitised with UV and not Chlorine so it won't affect the quality of the water.

This is a great project and we thank the Government for working with us to maintain the project and create variations on the original scope.

The outcome, I believe will provide a lot more liveability with the heat of our water supply being significantly reduced. It still doesn't change the fact that we still need to manage our water, so we will still be asking you to moderate your usage and not waste water down the new gutters.

Spring is on the way so everyone should plant two trees each and let's cool this place down now the water is going to be cooler.

HOUSING, ANIMALS & MICROCHIPPING

Council Housing

Council plan to clad the exterior of another three (3) rental properties this financial year.

This work is expected to begin in roughly 4-5 weeks.

Housing Maintenance

If something requires fixing at your Council rental property, you must complete either the "Form 4 Housing Maintenance Request" form or phone the Council Office on 4621 8000.

Any maintenance requests reported over the phone will be entered into Council's requests system.

If you have submitted a maintenance request but no one has been to your place to fix the issue, please be assured that Council have noted the maintenance request and will organise to have • A certificate and details of the microchip repairs carried out by a gualified tradesman as soon as possible.

If Council is unable to fix the issue or it is something that is very expensive, Council may need to budget for this item. If this is the case, Council's staff will be in contact with you.

Animals

A reminder to all animal owners that Registration Renewals are due for the 2020-21 financial year for all dogs and Livestock.

Livestock owners are required to complete the application forms that were mailed and return them to the Council office for approval

Dogs in the Bulloo Shire must be registered with the Bulloo Shire Council:

- upon reaching three months of age (12 weeks)
- within 14 days of obtaining your dog (if the dog is older than three months of age) within 14 days of moving into the Bulloo Shire Council area.

Dog registration is a requirement of State legislation outlined in the Animal Management (Cats and Dogs) Act 2008.

In Queensland all cats and dogs between 8 and 12 weeks of age, acquired after 1 July 2009. must be implanted with а microchip.



When you go to register your new dog with Council, you must ensure the dog has a microchip and supply the microchip number (Council officers can

scan for microchips), otherwise you will be unable to register the dog until after the dog has been microchipped.

Microchipping

On 1 July 2009 the Animal Management (Cats and Dogs) Act 2008 was introduced. The Act states that owners must ensure all new dogs and cats acquired are microchipped by an authorised implanter unless the person has a reasonable excuse. Failure to meet the requirements under the Act in regards to microchipping may result in quite substantial fines being incurred.

If you owned a dog or cat that was older than 12 weeks of age at the time of implementation of the Act (1 July 2009) and still own the dog or cat, you don't need to microchip your dog or cat, although it is recommended.

What must I do if I buy or am given a dog or cat?

- If the dog or cat is over the age of 8 weeks you must ensure that the dog or cat is microchipped.
- registry company should be provided to you by the person who sold or gave you the animal.
- If you acquire a dog or cat over the age of 8 weeks that is not microchipped, it becomes your responsibility to have the dog or cat microchipped.

It is a requirement under the Act for the owner of a microchipped animal to contact the microchip provider to change details such as a change of address, change of ownership or any change to the status of the animal within 7 days.

What must I do if I sell or give away a dog or cat?

- You must ensure the dog or cat is microchipped if over the age of 8 weeks by an authorised implanter.
- Puppies and kittens as well as older animals - can still be given away, however each animal must be microchipped if they are older than 8 weeks of age.
- Provide the buyer with number of the microchip and the details of the microchip registry.

Microchipping your dog or cat and having all details current will ensure that if the animal does escape its yard, it will be reunited with its owners as quickly as possible.

Bulloo Shire Council does not currently provide a service to microchip dogs or cats, however Council does engage a local veterinarian to visit Thargomindah yearly to microchip and vaccinate dogs and cats at the owners cost.



ROADS ROADS ROADS IMPROVING BULLOO ROADS



Another busy month for the Roads Services Department, and what a wet month it has been. Everyone has been kept busy with their normal jobs and then add on top of that the extra jobs of doing road runs, checking and closing roads.

Warri Gate Road - work is underway with the crew working hard, with a few setbacks from the rain. This project will see 5.27km of new seal near the Noccundra end of Warri Gate Road joining the bitumen together, this is estimated to be finished by October 2020.

Soil Testing - Border-Tek is coming out at the end of August to do compaction and soil testing.

Quilpie Road - Shoulder work has been in the process, and is due to be completed at the end of this month.

Other TMR Works - Ongoing works on floodways and TMR Flood Damage.

Innamincka Road - work has begun on the 2.27 km unsealed section and although the job has had a few set backs from Rain, it is

due to be finalised by December 2020 (weather permitting).

The completion of these works will see a sealed road to the South Australian border.

Maintenance Crew - Bulloo Shire Council Maintenance Crew had a call out to clear debris from a caravan roll over on Eromanga Road, they have also been busy patching and clearing debris after the rain events we have had recently.

RURAL SERVICES

On Thursday 13 August, 5 landholders attended the Property Mapping Workshop in Thargomindah. This program allows landholders to map paddocks, water facilities and infrastructure such as fencing.

We would like to thank AgForce for running this workshop in Thargomindah.



Bunny Ears forms a dense shrub 40-60 cm tall, occasionally more, composed of pad-like stems, 6-15 cm long and 4-12 cm broad. There is no central stem and pads always grown in pairs giving the appearance of bunny ears.

It has no spines, but instead has numerous white or yellow (golden) glochids (hair-like prickles), 2-3 cm long in dense clusters; these detach very easily on being touched and can cause considerable skin irritation so the plants must be treated with caution. Flowers are yellow 3 cm wide. Fruits are fleshy globular shape to 3 cm long and red-purple in colour.

Methods of spread

The main method of spread is from broken segments through people unknowingly giving potted plants away, and being transported on animals, people, vehicles and water.



Control

All suspected sightings of bunny ears plants must be reported to Biosecurity Queensland, which will work with the relevant person to control the plant. *Contact Details* Biosecurity Queensland—13 25 23



Water Agreements

James Theuerkauf and Tay Luckraft are currently updating the water agreements for dams and bores that Council access for road works. Tay will be contacting landholders prior to these visits.

Noccundra

Wilson River Campground recorded 255 campground registrations during July, 69 of these had pets with them. Council has completed repairs to the airstrip and the road to the campgrounds. Neil also completed Airport Reporting Training during July. The Noccundra caretaker has all relevant COVID-19 requirements in place including increased cleaning regime for public amenities and a register of those camping on the Wilson River.





Wild Dog Management

Trapping assistance was undertaken on Moombidary Station, where landholders have found dog sign and tracks.

Council's RLO has trail cameras operating along with CPEs (Canine Pest Injector) on Wiralla and Yakara Stations following reports of increased tracks including pups.



Weeds

Council's Rural Lands Officer will commence RMPC spraying during August due to wet conditions at Arcoba (coral cactus) and Orient (castor oil bush).

Inspection of the bug on coral cactus was undertaken on the Blackgate Road, with the cochineal bug well established in this infestation.

Common Prickly Pear has emerged at the same site since the rain, this will be treated with chemical spray as the infestation is not large enough to treat with cactoblastis.

Creek Doctor

To help landholders in the south west region better understand what they can do to improve the conditions for water on their properties, SQ Landscapes has engaged Peter McAdam AKA 'The Creek Doctor' to travel and consult at sites around Eulo, Hungerford, Thargomindah, Quilpie and Charleville with the aim of improving landscape hydration and in-stream flows.



Great Artesian Basin Strategic Management Plan

The Great Artesian Basin Strategic Management Plan is now available.

On Monday 27 July 2020, the Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment - and their partners in Queensland, New South Wales, South Australia and the Northern Territory - welcomed the release of the latest Great Artesian Basin Strategic Management Plan.

This Plan brings in new technical knowledge, better sustainable water resource management practices, and changing social and political contexts to build on the success of the first Strategic Management Plan of 2000. There is also a focus on aligning Basin management more closely with nationally agreed strategies and frameworks, including the National Water Initiative.

The Plan was developed in consultation with the Great Artesian Basin Coordinating Committee (GABCC), stakeholders, and considered feedback through a public consultation process.

The Plan provides a framework for governments, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders, water users and other stakeholders to achieve economic, environmental, cultural and social outcomes for the Great Artesian Basin (the Basin) and its users.

Implementation of the Plan will assist all parties to identify and respond to the risks, issues, challenges and opportunities associated with use of Basin water.

Basin governments, community and industry representatives agreed to 7 guiding principles. These are used to achieve economic, environmental, cultural and social outcomes for the Basin.



These will help to achieve economic, environmental, cultural and social outcomes.

A new Great Artesian Basin Stakeholder Advisory Committee (the Committee) is being established to advise on whole-of-Basin policies and initiatives. The Committee will play a pivotal role on a range of matters that will support the long-term sustainability of the Basin.

The Plan spans 15 years (ending 2034). It will be reviewed every 5 years. A copy of the Plan can be viewed at:

Gardening Tips

All this garden action can be a little mis-leading because cold days and frosts are still likely for a few more weeks. There's plenty for you to do in the garden during September, mostly tidying up and preparing for planting next month. Start your disease control program on deciduous fruit trees this month.

1. PLANTING

In warm temperate and subtropical areas, Australian native plants, evergreen trees, shrubs and climbers can continue to be planted, as well as salad vegetables, herbs and seasonal flowering annuals. Check out what's in stock in your garden centre.

• Seasonal flowers:

Bloomer pots of spring flowering annuals can still be planted out this month for patches of instant impact colour – pansies, violas, Iceland poppies, cinerarias, calendulas are just a few. In warm areas plant seedlings of bedding begonias, marigolds, impatiens and nasturtiums.

• Woody and perennial herbs:

"Hard" herbs - rosemary, sage, thyme, bay laurel, oregano, mint* – may be planted now in warm climates. "Soft" herbs – parsley, basil, coriander, chives, tarragon – may be grown indoors in cooler areas or outdoors in warmer climates.

*Mint should be grown in a pot to stop it becoming invasive.

• What flowers to plant:

Potted roses in full leaf can be planted now. It's too late now to plant advanced flowering pots out into the garden but they can be used to add splashes of colour to verandas and decks.

• In warmer areas, plant annual seedlings of:

- Dianthus
- Gaillardia
- Geum
- Gypsophila
- Honesty
- Impatiens
- Nasturtium
- Petunias
- Statice
- Zinnias

Spring Gardening Tips

Spring is in the air ...

It's that wonderful time of year when the garden comes to life again after Winter. Deciduous blossom and fruit trees are in full bloom, there are bulb and seasonal flowers aplenty and other trees and shrubs are sprouting bright green new leaves and shoots.

2. THE VEGETABLE PATCH:

• Harvest now:

The last of the winter veggies, including cabbage, kale, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts and broccoli should be harvested early in the month. New season's asparagus will be peaking now. Harvest spears when about 15cm tall.

• What to plant now:

Continue planting certified virus-free strawberry plants and runners. Rhubarb crowns should be planted as soon as possible. It's too cold in southern areas to sow tomato seeds, even under cover. Wait until early October.

• In temperate to warm areas plant:

Beetroot
Carrot
Chinese cabbage
Choko
Kohl rabi
Tomato
Pumpkin
Zucchini

Veggie patch tips for September:

- Water in newly planted seedlings with a liquid fertiliser for vegetables and herbs or a certified organic fertiliser to give them a good start.
- After sowing seeds, water well to moisten the soil, then wait until shoots appear before watering again.
- Hand pull or hoe out weeds as they appear they compete for nutrients and moisture and may also harbour pests that could attack your crops.
- Pull out the last of the winter crops and put them into the compost bin if they are disease-free.
- Preparation for spring sowing and planting should be well underway. Keep the soil tilled, weed-free and moist.

WESTERN QUEENSLAND ALLIANCE OF COUNCILS INAUGURAL ASSEMBLY: LONGREACH 2020

WESTERN COUNCIL ALLIANCE BACKED BY ALL LEVELS OF GOVERNMENT AND READY TO RAMP UP REPUTATION & REPRESENTATION FOR REGION

The creation of the Western Queensland Alliance of Councils (WQAC) has been welcomed by member councils, Federal and State Government representatives as a proactive, timely and constructive initiative which will lead to improved outcomes for Western Queensland, the State and the nation.

Twenty-one councils have made the historic step to unite as the Western Queensland Alliance of Councils. The group held its Inaugural Assembly in Longreach on Monday 27 and Tuesday 28 July 2020 with all member councils represented, with the exception of Burke Shire and Doomadgee Aboriginal Shire Council.

Assembly attendees included two Federal Ministers; a Senator; two State Ministers; the three local members; two Directors General and senior Federal and State departmental officers; President and CEO of the LGAQ; and media.

The Prime Minister also sent a message via video to the Assembly delegates thanking local government elected members for their hard work on the back of dealing with drought, floods and now COVID-19.

The two-day program focussed on long term priorities for the region which will form the basis of a WQAC 2020 State *Election Platform*, and concluded with adoption of the Alliance through a *Memorandum of Agreement*.

"This is a generational opportunity and won't just benefit our regions. This is the first time we will have a clearly defined group across the West. As a group we are able to make sure government and LGAQ know that this one voice represents what 60% of the state is thinking and what their needs are," RAPAD Chair Cr Tony Rayner said.

The Alliance unites the 21 councils through their representative bodies: North West Queensland Regional Organisation of Councils (NWQROC); Remote Area Planning and Development Board (RAPAD); and the South West Local Government Association (SWLGA).

"As a group, we already punch well above our weight, and we also face the same issues. By joining forces we can open doors and get our messages out there. When you lobby as a group, or 'hunt in a pack' as we've heard at the Assembly, you can bring about a lot for your local areas," SWLGA Chair Cr Samantha O'Toole said.

Western Queensland's key industries of agriculture and resources are critical in supporting the State's economy which, based on current data, are outperforming the rest of the nation.

With this context in mind, speakers and guest presenters discussed the opportunities and continued potential of Western Queensland:

"As a region we are carrying well above our weight. Our agriculture and resources industries are essential to the State's economy. In the West we always deliver whatever crisis comes and our ability to keep on working and continue production during this global pandemic is proof of that - without it Queensland would be pretty stuffed right now," NWROC Chair, Cr Jack Bawden said.

The next steps for the Alliance will include ramping up their campaign ahead of the 2020 State Election and continuing to build the brand and reputation of the Alliance as the "united voice for all of Western Queensland".
