

Mayor John 'Tractor' Ferguson

Deputy Mayor Girdler, Cr Dogga, Cr Collins and myself attended a meeting with Telstra executive, May Boisen, Scott Mullaly and Jonathan New on 21 July.

May started the meeting to update Council on the backup generator, that will be installed at the exchange in Thargo. The outcome will enable recharging the battery unit to maintain mobile coverage during an extended period of power outage.

Jonathan outlined that the mobile signal in Hungerford supports only new phones with 4G capability and if you have an old phone then it won't work; he mentioned that in Thargo the signal supports both 3 and 4G; however, Telstra will be replacing the 3G signal within the next couple of years. Scott is happy to come and work with Tamie and her team and explain to shire residence the capability of their devices and what to check when purchasing a new phone. Scott mentioned that just because you purchased iPhone 6 from eBay, there is no guarantee that it will work here as it may have been configured for Europe or China.

Another point that was brought to Council information, is something called IOT or Internet Of Things, it's a low speed low data network introduced by Telstra to allow supporting infrastructure to receive and transmit critical information. Such application covers automated river gauges, and digital road closure signs. Using IOT devices, will allow receiving and sending data remotely. We provided the Telstra team with Council's priority for mobile coverage being Noccundra and Cameron Corner; they mentioned that they will work with us and support our case to extend coverage to these locations.

The prices received for Spa Gazing and Canteen projects were significantly higher than the allocated budget. Several contributing factors most critical one was an elaborate, sophisticated design compared to what Councillors originally wanted which is a simple design that produce elegant outcomes more suitable to outback southwest QLD. A report will be presented to August Council meeting providing lower cost alternatives and deliver these projects which has been on the books for some time.

Kullilli – Council Advisory Committee

Council approved forming an advisory committee with Kullilli Bulloo River Aboriginal Corporation. One of the key objectives is increasing cultural awareness of Kullilli People heritage connection to the area. The committee will be an avenue for information and idea exchange between Council and Kullilli people. Some of the initiatives the committee will be working on, is developing land management such as introducing Aboriginal burns, outlining some of the benefits in terms of reducing the risk of bushfire, through removing some of the undergrowth to create opportunity for native grasses to return and re-establish, which in turn stimulate and encourage biodiversity. Another task will be designing signs for various shire locations with information on the history of Kullilli country and provide information from Aboriginal prospective. Among a long list of items on the agenda for this committee, is developing ideas to establish a workshop for producing Aboriginal art effects, bush tucker and medicinal products. The committee will be a conduit to advice Council on capital works matters through increase cultural awareness to preserve the rich history of Aboriginal people in the area started some 65,000 years ago.

Hungerford

Council crews are completing maintenance Grading on Hungerford Road, with Mook and his crew working on the northern section, leaving Clancy heading north from the Hungerford end.









A major achievement that made the Hungerford residents appreciative of the road crew was repairing and sealing the Paroo River crossing. The concrete crew will finish up the work by adding protection margins over the next few days to ensure the integrity of the crossing considering high probability of a rare "triple La Niña" that would bring flooding rains and cooler weather for the third summer in a row.


What made the kitchen looks more interesting, is all the merchandise and display items for tourists, it is an excellent way to use this beautiful facility.





Green Country with Lots of Road Work Ahead

The land is looking great and there are lots of nice places to visit and see, taking advantage of the kind weather, one of the hidden treasures around Hungerford is the Budjiti Lookout at Currawinya National Park.





New Hamilton Gate Road

I completed an inspection on a few shire roads; although I'm the CEO and my official job is to sit behind a desk and push paper; I like to see the issue myself when I receive a complaint or a problem from residents they want Council to fix. One of these was the low formation level on sections of New Hamilton Gate Road, which runs from Hungerford in a southwest direction towards the NSW border. The road needs building up as it has been graded down over many years, which make susceptible to small rain events. This is a road that continues across the state border towards Wanaaring in NSW.



The Mirintu Access Road connected to the western end of Hamilton Gate Road is in similar condition and requires forming and re-instating drainage. The road terminates at the homestead, a place with lots of potential, an area where many tourists would love the opportunity to visit and explore. Should owners be interested in this market, Council's Tourism and Economic Development Manager Tamie Warner will welcome such inquiries and guide them through available options.



I came back to Thargo via Dribbler Bore Road, 83 km route which connects New Hamilton to Bulloo Downs Road, probably from shire staff only Mayor Tractor knows this road from his grading days a million years ago; the road had similar issues low formation, and overgrown vegetation with nowhere for the water to go but to run on the road surface.



What we ideally want our roads to look like, is similar to what the road crew had done on Hungerford Road, they started by clearing the vegetation and accessing roadside material to raise formation allowing the road to drain. This is essential to have durable roads that can withstand storms with limited damage.



We have a plan in place, a five-year plan that will achieve the results our community aspires too.

Rural Services

Phone, email and face to face consultations with landholders during the month on topics including, road conditions, RACQ Project, RBE Renewals, wild dog management, Excel spreadsheet workshop, weeds and second QFever Clinic. Properties consulted during the month include Nappa Merrie, Omicron, Epsilon, Orientos, Tickalara, Bulloo Downs, Dynevor Downs, Thargomindah Station, Wiralla, Autumnvale, Yakara, Boodgherree, Kilcowera, Moombidary, Nockatunga, Naryilco, Durham Downs, Picarilli, Bingara, Besm, Nooyeah and National Parks. Property visit to Moombidary and face to face consultation in town with Kilcowera, Nooyeah and Boodgherree.

Thargomindah Town Common Boundary Fence The fence line has now been cleared and a purchase order issued on 8 June 2022 for the of materials. A local contractor will be looking at the job and providing a quote in July. This project is being funded under the Works for Queensland Program.

SQ Landscapes provided \$10,000 funding towards weed work on Dynevor and Werewilke to treat Devil's Rope and Parkinsonia in partnership with National Parks. Due to the wet conditions, this has been extended into the new financial year.

Community Drought Support 2021-22 The Charleville Neighbourhood Centre is working once again with the Department of Communities, Housing and Digital Economy to offer Drought funding to the Bulloo Shire. This funding has been secured through the Queensland State Government's Community Drought Support Program 2021-22. This funding was fully exhausted at 30 June 2022. A new allocation for 2022-23 has been secured by Council.

Flexible Financial Hardship Funding (Rural Solutions Qld) Community Drought Support Flexible Hardship Funding is available to farmers, farm contractors, farm employees, tradespeople and non-farming small businesses and retail operators who rely upon regional agricultural economies. To be eligible, you must reside within one of the below Local Government Areas (LGA) and must demonstrate that your financial position has been negatively impacted by drought over the past two-year period. Support is available via a prepaid EFTPOS card which can be utilised for purchases at designated outlets within your LGA such as grocery stores. Rural Services team have been assisting community members to complete application forms for this funding. Positive feedback has been received from local businesses about this program.

Road Services

Brad Chatfield has been working on the Innamincka road shoulder grading, until two weeks ago when he went to Hungerford to take over as Lance Clancy went on two weeks leave, so Greg Brown has once again stepped up and taken over the job for Brad, and has been doing a great job.

Mook Beavis & Nathan Hortin both crews have been working together as one team on the Hungerford road doing light to medium formation grading, they have been cutting down the very high batters filing the deep table drains then cleaning up right out to where the trees have been cleared, this is taking a bit of time now but future gradings will be a lot quicker as we are trying to repair a lot of damage that has been done of many years from the way that these roads have been graded as table drains were so deep that we couldn't get the division drains cut deep enough to be able to drains off water.

Lance Clancy has been in Hungerford town we have cleaned up and removed all the trees and bushes from all the streets that were surveyed many years ago but never developed, then graded them. As the road going to the rubbish tip was cutting across a private block of land, when we cleared the rest of Camopus street up to Arcturus street, then gravelled them up to the rubbish tip so as they have a gravel road to the rubbish Tip.

We graded the road to the Airstrip and sports grounds, as there use to be a lot of water run off the airstrip it would follow the roadway right through to the main street in town, we cleared trees along the roadway and built Whoa-Boys along the roadway to try and divert the water off the roadway.

The Paroo River crossing across in Hungerford, we had the Stabiliser go over it and put in a Slag/Lime, this was then shaped with a 3 % cross fall up stream, this will be bitumen sealed on the 21/07/2022. Once this seal is completed we will then reinstate new guide posts and new depth gauges. Ordinary Council Meeting Agenda 19 July 2022 Item 14.2 Page 34

Clancy is now working on light to medium formation grading on the Hungerford road, working up to where Mook & Nathan's crew started, which was just South of the New Hamilton Gate road.

Maintenance Crew - They have been working on a lot of different jobs, Brenton & Braydon have been replacing Guide Posts on the Bundeena Road, Warri Gate road, Hungerford road and Innamincka road. They have a lot of guide posts to replace yet on these roads because we have been doing a lot of shoulder grading so as a lot of the shoulder has been completed they should soon be catching up with guide posts.

We have also been doing a lot of sign replacement on Hungerford road, Bulloo Downs road, Soona Crossing road and the Innamincka road, this will be an ongoing job yet for some time as a lot of the road signs have been in place for over 30yrs and are well past their use by date.

We have also been cleaning up the top yard removing a lot of rubbish that should have been put in the dump from the start, also rearranging a lot of the stuff and putting it in some sort of order.



Purpose

This pack has been developed to help promote the awareness of Varroa mite (Varroa destructor) to beekeepers.

You are welcome to optimise the content of this pack to suit your needs. It can be used to inform newsletter content and/ or social media posts.

Who should use this pack?

This pack is specifically tailored for beekeepers, and we welcome the following organisations to share:

- Queensland Beekeepers Association
- Australian Honey Bee Industry Council
- Queensland beekeeping groups, including hobbyists
- Local government and councils
- Pest controllers

Current situation

A <u>Movement Control Order</u> is in place in Queensland to keep varroa destructor mite (varroa mite) out of the state. This order restricts the movement of bees, beehives and bee products (including honey) from NSW into Queensland.

You are allowed to enter Queensland with bees, beehives and bee products (including honey) from other states and territories that are deemed to be free from varroa.

There is currently a standstill in place in NSW which applies to the movement of bees, beehives, bee products and used bee keeping equipment within the state.

How we can help you

A <u>permit system</u> has been established to move bees, hives, used beekeeping equipment and bee products, including honey, into Queensland from NSW under certain circumstances.

What can you do?

- If you own or keep at least one hive, you must <u>register as a biosecurity entity</u>.
 Registration is free for non-commercial beekeepers*
- Remain on alert for the presence of varroa mite.
- Look for unexpected hive deaths, deformed bees, bees with parasites, poor brood patterns and dead brood.
- Conduct surveillance on your hives as soon as practicable in the form of sugar shaking, drone uncapping or alcohol washing.
- Immediately report any of the above to Biosecurity Queensland on 13 25 23.
- If you're unsure or need a reminder on how to action these, access the <u>Queensland</u> <u>Government eHub–Help protect our bees—your questions answered.</u>



Varroa mite (Varroa destructor) has been detected in New South Wales.

A Movement Control Order is in place in Queensland restricting the movement of bees and bee hives from New South Wales into Queensland to keep Varroa destructor (varroa mite) out of the state.

You will continue to be allowed to enter Queensland with bees and beehives from other states free from varroa. There is currently a standstill in place in NSW which applies to the movement of bees, bee hives, bee products and used bee keeping equipment within the state.

The Queensland Government is working closely with Queensland Beekeepers' Association Inc (QBA) to assist in the national response efforts and support the surveillance activities to protect the Queensland honey bee industry.

Beekeepers, please monitor your hives and immediately report unexpected hive deaths, deformed bees, bees with parasites, poor brood patterns and dead brood to Biosecurity Queensland – call us on 13 25 23.



Naturally occurring fluoride in Thargomindah's drinking water

Fluoride is a natural element often found in water, plants, rocks, soil, air and some foods. Research shows that fluoride helps protect teeth against tooth decay. Regularly drinking water containing small amounts of fluoride can help reduce tooth decay for people of all ages.

What is the drinking water standard for fluoride?

The Australian Drinking Water Guidelines recommend an upper limit of 1.5 milligrams per litre (or parts per million) of fluoride in drinking water. This is equivalent to one twentieth of a teaspoon of fluoride in a bathtub of water.

Many Western Queensland towns source their drinking water from groundwater (i.e. bores). These water sources can contain natural fluoride levels that are above this limit.

Monitoring of Thargomindah's drinking water supply has indicated that it contains naturally occurring fluoride in the range from 1.6 to 1.9 milligrams per litre. This is slightly above the recommended limit in the Guidelines.

Conventional water treatment processes and most domestic water filters do not reduce the level of fluoride present in your drinking water.

What are the risks of elevated levels of fluoride in drinking water?

There are two side effects that have been associated with elevated levels of fluoride in drinking water. The first is dental fluorosis and the second is skeletal fluorosis, which only occurs with very high levels of fluoride in drinking water.

What is dental fluorosis?

The main side effect associated with elevated levels of fluoride in drinking water is a condition known as dental fluorosis.

Dental fluorosis is largely an aesthetic concern and most often occurs as a mild change to the appearance of tooth enamel. It can appear as small, almost invisible, white lines in the enamel. More rarely, and in more severe cases, it can appear as pitting or staining of the enamel.

Dental fluorosis can occur if too much fluoride is ingested when teeth are developing at around one to four years of age. Teeth already present in the mouth are not at risk of developing fluorosis.

The risk of developing dental fluorosis, or experiencing more severe forms of the condition, increases with greater levels of fluoride in drinking water. However occasionally dental fluorosis occurs in developing teeth at relatively low fluoride levels.

Showering or bathing in water containing high levels of fluoride does not increase the risk of developing dental fluorosis.



What can I do to minimise the risk of dental fluorosis?

Most domestic water filters do not reduce the level of fluoride present in your drinking water. Parents can reduce the risk of children developing dental fluorosis by:

- Ensuring children do not take fluoride supplements (e.g. fluoride tablets and/or drops).
- Cleaning children's teeth with low fluoride or fluoride free toothpaste until the age of 18 months, unless otherwise recommended by a dentist.
- If fluoridated toothpaste is used, ensuring only a pea-sized amount of toothpaste is used and that children spit out after brushing and rinse their mouths with water.
- Monitoring and restricting other sources of fluoride in their children's diet (such as seafood and tea, which are known to contain fluoride).
- Providing bottled drinking water with low fluoride content where possible and not substituting bottled drinking water with soft drinks or other drinks high in sugar.
- Breast-feeding infants where possible and using bottled water to add to infant formula.



Residential, Commercial and Industrial Properties within Thargomindah

Council has designated waste collection days for Residential, Commercial and Industrial Properties within Thargomindah.

Commercial and Industrial collection days are Monday and Thursday;

Residential waste will only be collected on a Thursday.

Council request that residents place their wheelie bin, with the wheels facing away from the road, on the footpath adjacent to the kerb, or a metre back from the bitumen where no kerb and channel exists. Please ensure your bin is placed out for collection the night prior or before 6.30am on the day of collection to ensure your bin is emptied.


